

About me

I am an independent thinker, researcher, consultant, author, and speaker. I am mostly known for my work on communities of practice, though I consider myself a social learning theorist more generally. Theoretically, my work focuses on social learning systems. I am trying to understand the connection between knowledge, community, learning, and identity. The basic idea is that human knowing is fundamentally a social act. This simple observation has profound implications for the way we think of and attempt to support learning.

Practically, these ideas are helping people who face all sorts of challenges, such as:

- design more effective knowledge-oriented organizations
- create learning systems across organizations
- improve education and lifelong learning
- rethink the role of professional associations
- design a world in which people can reach their full potential

I have been making a living helping people and organizations apply these ideas. I do consulting, workshops, and public speaking.

How I got here

I started my career working as as a French teacher for many years first in Hong Kong and later in Denver.

There I was also an assistant principal for two years. Then I got interested in the use of computer in education. I got a B.S. in computer science from the university of Geneva and a Ph.D. in artificial intelligence at the University of California at Irvine, focusing on intelligent tutoring systems. In 1987 I joined the Institute for Research on Learning (IRL), where I started to work with anthropologist Jean Lave on the development of a new learning theory centered on the concept of community of practice. Since 1997, I have been helping organizations develop and implement social learning strategies based on communities of practice. I have also kept developing the theory, working with numerous universities, in particular at the University of Manchester, UK, where I am a visiting professor. I now continue both the theoretical and the practical dimensions of this work with my spouse and partner, Beverly Wenger-Trayner.



I grew up in Switzerland in a small town called Neuchâtel. It is by a large lake of the same name. Across the lake, in the distance, you can see the Alps on a clear day. Could be why I always longed to go far and explore.

In my youth, I was a hippie. I also lived in an ashram, both in India and Switzerland.

I was a French teacher, first in Hong Kong for three years, then in Denver for two. All this sparked my interest in learning, especially after I started to read the work of Maria Montessori.

Most of the people in Hong Kong were taking French to gain a few points on the Canadian immigration scale and the kids in Denver were largely uninterested. I wanted to have something more relevant to teach. So, I returned to Switzerland to study computer science at the University of Geneva. This led me to become interested in computer-based approaches to learning.

After moving to the University of California at Irvine to do a PhD, I became interested in artificial intelligence and its applicability to education. A broad survey of that field was the topic of my first book. This early book got me invited to a new, interdisciplinary research outfit in Palo Alto, the Institute for Research on Learning.

There I started to work with an anthropologist, Jean Lave, who had been studying traditional apprenticeship. Together, we started the line of research on communities of practice. Those were deeply formative years. When the institute ended, I went off on my own to follow where the concept of community of practice was being adopted.

I have been married three times. My first wife, Anita, was Chinese; my second wife, Paula, American. I am now married to Beverly who is my ideal partner in life and work. I guess third time's the charm.

Bev and I agreed we would live in California until my youngest went to college. After that, it would be Bev's turn to decide where we live. She chose Portugal, where she had lived more than 20 years before our marriage. So, after spending 37 years in California, I have moved to Portugal. We found the perfect house to both live and start our Social Learning Lab. It took a lot of work to restore it

from years of neglect, but we could not be happier with it.
